

Dental Expert To Be Called

WACO (AP)— A plaster cast of David Wayne Spence's teeth was introduced into evidence Tuesday as prosecutors prepared to call a forensic dental specialist who they say can match bite marks found on the teen-ager Spence is accused of killing.

Spence, 25, is accused of the slayings of two Waxahachie girls, Raylene Rice and Jill Montgomery, and a Waco teen-ager, Kenneth Franks. Spence is on trial only in Ms. Montgomery's slaying.

Prosecutors said Tuesday that they would call Dr. Homer Campbell of Albuquerque, N.M., who is expected to testify that he can link bite marks on the female victims' bodies with Spence's dental pattern.

Campbell was involved in the case of convicted mass murderer Theodore Bundy, who left bitemarks on some of his victims.
